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As part of God's people we are called by God, empowered by the Holy Spirit, to share the love and grace of Jesus Christ, within our community through regular worship, faithful witness and humble service.

REFLECTION:

People of Faith Need to Keep Growing – Sunday June 13 2021, Pentecost 3.

My brothers and I can tell you that our parents were great gardeners – Mum with flowers and Dad with vegetables. They sowed, planted and nurtured growth, making great use of the resources available to them such as manure, blood and bone, water and weeding. The results rewarded their interest and labour.

It is easy to transfer that example across to portion of our Gospel lesson for worship and beyond today.

St Mark Chapter 4 verses 30 to 32 record Jesus telling his listeners about what God's Kingdom is like in a Parable we know as the Parable of the Mustard Seed.

We should take notice of what the sower of this tiny seed does. He sows the seed; he waits; he harvests.

That has much to do with you and me. Jesus sows the seed of faith and his call to follow him in each of us. He watches over that seed of faith and love and responds to our presence in his Church as a sign of our willingness to be identified with him. Just like the sower of the mustard seed watches over it and identifies with it through patience and harvest.

We are reminded again, through this Parable, that the value of the tiny seed can be easily overlooked, but its being sown is crucial for without it nothing happens. As followers of Jesus, you and I can often think our efforts and influence are small compared to others.

However, one of the points Jesus would have us recognise is that the mustard seed grows to a big tree and becomes crucial to those who need it. What examples might we draw from the Church's story that will remind us of this fact? Well, no matter what we think of them today – the Church started the Trade Union movement; out of a concern for children's well-being

the Church started Sunday Schools, despite their modern-day demise; and from early times the Church started hospitals. And the stories continued....

Throughout all of this, there is one important factor about the mustard seed – it needs to be re-sown annually. Hence, you and I need to keep growing as disciples.

As I said in the introduction many resources are brought into play in the growth of what has been planted – manure, water, weeding. We have a number of resources upon which we as Christians can draw. We can pray – individually or collectively, we can open our Bible and read, ask and search the meaning of its words telling us what God is doing and can do, we have each other's fellowship in caring words, thoughts and actions, we can sing hymns and faith songs to ourselves or collectively, we can support initiatives in charity, we can suggest initiatives and so it goes under our Lord's guidance and leadership. In one sense that is what Jesus' Parables were designed to accomplish.

Inherent in this call to follow and be a sower of seeds like the mustard is that the sower or planter does so, with a sense of anticipation. If it were not so, I wouldn't be here preaching, nor would you be here at worship if we were not hoping that growth for our Lord's sake and Kingdom would happen.

So, no matter what, we keep at our discipleship trusting in God that he is at work. We live with the lovely mystery that through all of the sowing and planting we grow in faith and service that we will contribute to the harvest through God's grace.

As St Paul reminded the people of Jesus in Galatia there is an outcome of planting, watering and God's involvement. He described it as the fruit of the Spirit. What fruit it is – love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, fidelity, gentleness and self-control.

I believe we are guided by Jesus to see that as well as the learnings we can take from the Parable of the Mustard Seed there is another important message from it for us to take and keep in our faith, mind and heart today and tomorrow. It is this – this is a Parable of reassurance and encouragement telling us that what we do it is worth the effort and patient waiting for the seed and its growth to take effect.

To draw this reassurance and encouragement together I want to share with you the words of one of the best writers of the commentaries on St Mark's Gospel.

Lamar Williamson, Jr. formerly a Professor of Biblical Studies commenting on this Parable writes, and I share . . .

"Our efforts sometimes seem to be in vain, but in the end we shall marvel, as a sower at harvest. Growth and change occur while we sleep, we know not how."

Reflection: Thanks for Their Gifts

I rejoiced greatly in the Lord that at last you renewed your concern for me. Indeed, you were concerned, but you had no opportunity to show it. I am not saying this because I am in need, for I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances. I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want. I can do all this through him who gives me strength.

Yet it was good of you to share in my troubles. Moreover, as you Philippians know, in the early days of your acquaintance with the gospel, when I set out from Macedonia, not one church shared with me in the matter of giving and receiving, except you only; for even when I was in Thessalonica, you sent me aid more than once when I was in need. Not that I desire your gifts; what I desire is that more be credited to your account. I have received full payment and have more than enough. I am amply supplied, now that I have received from Epaphroditus the gifts you sent. They are a fragrant offering, an acceptable sacrifice, pleasing to God.

Phil. 4:10-18

Reflection: A Philippian believer: "Paul is in a much worse situation than we are - and yet he rejoices! He is in prison, again. I'm very thankful that I'm not in prison. But Paul says he is content, no matter what his situation. How can he say this? How can we have this contentment too?

"What a huge step it feels like for us to get to this place of contentment...and I'm not even in prison! It seems to me Paul's contentment is independent of his circumstances. He's in prison, yet he is not worried for himself because whether he lives or dies, he is certain of his eternal life with Jesus.

"Paul says we Philippian believers are the only ones who gave him support after he shared the good news with us. I am so amazed Paul thanks us for looking after him when he needed help. Some people don't think he is gracious, but this shows he is. He says he is *amply supplied*, and that our gifts are a *fragrant offering*! We were so happy to give to him and support his travels because of the amazing gift he gave us in the gospel! It is only because we have received grace from God that we have done this."

A few thoughts for us....

- 1. If we are not content, what steps can we take to move towards contentment in God?
- 2. Thank God for all who have given us 'gifts' those who helped us to know Jesus and to grow in trust. Thank God for the gift others have given us, to understand us, our concerns, our anxieties, listening to us, praying for us, and caring for us practically and emotionally.
- 3. If we don't have people like this in our lives, what is a step we can take towards having some? How can we be this person to others?

Prayer: Father, I thank you for caring for me in every way. Thank you for providing for me. Please help me to be content, in every situation. Please help me to be good a steward /manager of all you have given me. Please help me to be generous and gracious, as you are so amazingly generous and gracious to me. Amen.
