REFLECTION: FORGETTING GOD

Last week I watched a programme about the life of Billy Graham, the great evangelist of the 50's onwards. It ended up being more politically orientated than spiritually, which disappointed me, but it did cover a lot of his early evangelistic life and his crusades.

I remember his Sydney Crusade and being there and being carried away with the great sense of occasion, the great outpouring of religious fervour and the stirring preaching of Billy Graham himself. I can still picture George Beverly Shea singing "How Great Thou Art". They are very wonderful memories.

But, back to the documentary. At one of Billy Graham's crusades, he made a very strong and hard-hitting comment. He stated that "America had forgotten God!" In amongst the economic growth and people's access to more wealth and freedom, the people of America he said had "Forgotten God."

That statement was no doubt relevant then and the response to his preaching and his message demonstrated that many of the people had indeed "forgotten" God and they responded to his call to turn back to God.

As I thought about that statement, I really feel that Australia is in that same position today. Many, many people have forgotten God. They have replaced God with material possessions. They have pushed God into the background of their lives and have forgotten him and I feel that to a large degree the churches have let this happen.

There are a variety of reasons why this has happened and that's for another time. The basic message I feel we have to get out to today's world is that God has not gone away. He is still with us. He is available to one and all and he still has so much to give out, free with no terms or conditions. It is a very basic message but has so much to offer.

Forgetting God is not a new scenario. Our Old Testament tells us that Moses faced the same problem. Moses, knowing the mere fact that he wouldn't be able to enter into the promised

land and that his fellow Israelites were about to take over the land, set a warning before them to not dare to forget God when they enter and enjoy the gift of the promised land.

One of the problems then and still is, is how easily people remove God from the picture when we/they enjoy good things. Because of the alluring beauty of blessings and the happiness it brings, we become preoccupied with it, and the thought of God easily vanish from our minds. We forget God.

Moses reminded the Israelites of three things:

- 1. God gives real satisfaction. Out of God's mouth comes real satisfaction. Satisfaction that no material possession can match.
- 2. God's goodness in the past. A glimpse of our past will reveal the remarkable footsteps of God's goodness to us. Our past experience of God's goodness is a good starting point to be humble and acknowledge God in every season of life. Humility is the antidote to forgetfulness of God.
- 3. God gives enablement. God provides enablement to carry out our daily tasks. Our strength, wisdom, opportunities are all by-products of the Sovereign One. We may have good visions in life and lay-out plans but only God gives opportunities to work out those visions and plans. In other words, it is an imperative for us to realize that we all depend on God for enablement. This truth calls us to be humble enough to avoid the pitfall of forgetting God.

Those three reminders are there for all of us and if we apply them to our daily living then the task of remembering God, not forgetting him, is so much easier. (GMP)

Helpful information received from Westpac Bank:

BEEN ASKED TO RETURN A MISTAKEN PAYMENT?

New Scam alert! Phishing SMS/emails aim to capture personal and banking details via fake websites.

You receive a payment to your bank account.

Someone claiming to have sent you the payment in error contacts you via phone or SMS, asking you to return the funds to an account number. Callers may claim to be the bank or sender of the funds.

You complete the payment via Online Banking.

Customers actioning these requests noticed further payments to the payee by scammers using the compromised credentials.

Financial institutions have processes for mistaken payments, notifying you in writing (not a phone call from a number that may appear genuine). (Gordon Henshaw)

Reflection Jesus Anointed at Bethany

Six days before the Passover, Jesus came to Bethany, where Lazarus lived, whom Jesus had raised from the dead. Here a dinner was given in Jesus' honor. Martha served, while Lazarus was among those reclining at the table with him. Then Mary took about a pint of pure nard, an expensive perfume; she poured it on Jesus' feet and wiped his feet with her hair. And the house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. But one of his disciples, Judas Iscariot, who was later to betray him, objected, John 12:1-4

Jesus caused a scandal by modelling and teaching an intimate relationship with God, whom he called 'Father' (Mark 14:36). The religious leaders of his time thought Jesus to be outrageous, presumptive and scandalous (John 5:17-18). The reality was, of course, that Jesus was demonstrating something that was profoundly true.

No other religion features such a level of intimacy with God.

As a theologian, it occurred to me that almost every heresy that has afflicted the church has the inevitable outcome of turning God into someone who is distant and unknowable—a false god who hides behind the mask of a thousand different religions.

When Jesus visited his friends at Bethany, three things happened: Martha got so busy she didn't have time to be with Jesus; Mary sat in Jesus' presence and anointed his feet with perfume; and Judas worried about money. Only one of them realized that they were made for intimacy with God.

Presbytery News:

Presbytery met on Sat 21 August. There were 60 participants. The theme of the meeting was Advocacy and, after a presentation from the Presbytery Social Justice Group, the meeting was split into small groups for a discussion on advocacy:

What issues are you passionate about?

What do you want to advocate about?

How are you going to advocate for this?

How can your congregation connect with the Presbytery Social Justice Group?

What kind of networking can we develop?

The meeting then reconvened for whole group discussion. Some of the issues raised across the groups were – affordable housing in the ACT and shelter for the homeless; environment and climate change; women's rights; health concerns; aged care and housing; refugees and asylum seekers and overseas concerns. It was suggested that congregations with these concerns could link into Synod resources, join with other churches with the same concerns (not just UCA); be ready when a window of opportunity opens to act; the need to better connect across the Presbytery to support each other on these issues.

The Treasurer reported that the balance of the UCIF loan was paid in two instalments in July and August.

The proposal submitted to the Moderators Appeal Fund for a community chaplain based at Mt Dromedary parish was successful, with a grant of \$60,000 per year for two years to fund the position. Presbytery will now advertise to appoint, and John Squires will discuss with the congregation. John Williams and team were thanked for their hard work on this proposal. Presbytery will write to Rev Kerry Bartlett's family to advise on success of bid (as Kerry was heavily involved in the proposal).

The Chairperson advised that there will be positions to fill at the AGM, particularly that of Assistant Treasurer. Full training will be provided for the person who takes on the roll.
